Chapter 350 of the Code of Iowa

350.1 Purposes. The purposes of this chapter are to create a county conservation board and to authorize counties to acquire, develop, maintain, and make available to the inhabitants of the county, public museums, parks, parkways, playgrounds, recreational centers, timbers, wildlife and other conservation areas, and to promote and preserve the health and general welfare of the people, to encourage the orderly development and conservation of natural resources, and to cultivate good citizenship by providing adequate programs of public recreation.

The Benton County Conservation Board's (BCCB) duty is to serve the residents of Benton County. The BCCB consists of five county residents appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

History

In 1955, the lowa State Legislature passed a law for the creation of county conservation boards. In 1956, public vote of Benton County residents authorized the creation of the BCCB. The BCCB was one of sixteen counties in lowa to make a conservation board that year and has been working on preserving lowa's natural heritage since that day. The BCCB built the first man-made lake by a county conservation department in the state of lowa, Hannen Lake. Our 25 plus properties make up over 1,600 acres, offer several opportunities from hiking and bike trails, boat ramps, fishing, hunting, disc golf, equestrian trails, campground facilities, and more.


The Benton County Conservation Foundation is a 501(c)3.

The general purpose of this organization is to promote preservation and enhancement of our natural resources through education and conservation, as provided for in Chapter 350 of the Code of Iowa, in the following manner:

- Promote the conservation of natural resources through a variety of educational programs.
- Conserve and protect unique natural areas.
- Develop and maintain suitable programs of public recreation.
- Serve the citizens of Benton County by assisting and interacting with other public service agencies.

The foundation shall fulfill its purpose by undertaking the following roles:

- Serving as an organizational base for volunteers for conservation programs.
- Helping raise funds for designated projects and educational projects of the Benton County Conservation Board (BCCB).
- Advising the BCCB as to the needs of the community regarding programming.
- Supporting and furthering the functions of the BCCB by serving as a vehicle for community involvement.



Public Presence and Outreach

Staff continues to increase social media output. Google analytics show thousands of clicks for Benton County Conservation every year. In fiscal year 2024, Facebook had 3.900 followers with an outreach of 509.800 individual outreach for this fiscal year.

The department attends and represents at local events such as town parades, National Night Out, county health events, Party in the Park, Jake's Day, etc. The department also publishes quarterly newsletters. Each Patrol Unit and the Nature Center host at least one county wide public event per year.

Benton County Conservation hosts a property tour every year for the Benton County Board of Supervisors, Benton County Conservation Board, and Benton County Conservation Staff.

Benton County Conservation stepped up to have the IRM department under our umbrella

Economic Benefit and Quality of Life

In 2012, a study titled Economic Value of Outdoor Recreation Activities in Iowa was conducted to show the value of our outdoor areas. In this study, usage in county parks was valued at \$25.37 per person, average spending. This implies that our 32,721 registered camping individuals alone brought an economic benefit of \$830,131.77 to the county (even more given the year this study was conducted).

** This is not including camping revenue fees or any day use benefits. For day use (which would be valued at \$25.37 per person per day in 2012), we know that we have several thousand of day-use individuals including disc golfers, hikers, bikers, walkers, anglers, hunters, boaters, and equestrian riders. This brings in additional hundreds of thousands of dollars.

"Economic Impacts of Natural Resources and Outdoor Amenities in Iowa: Participating in outdoor recreation typically involves expenditures such as travel, food, supplies, and specialized equipment (e.g., bikes, fishing tackle, hunting equipment, licenses, and special clothing). Identifying and measuring these expenses is one way to estimate the value people place on a particular recreational activity. Natural resources have value even when no expenditures are made while participating."
